

But I don't know how to zoom?!*£@_§,!

Zoom is a computer application that allows multiple people to sign in to listen to and/or participate in a meeting. The Springs Board has been Zooming meetings since September, with good results. Folks can see and hear each other and the discussion is productive. The one part lacking in our meetings is input from residents in the open forum, as most folks either don't log on to listen or don't stay long enough to give input. We haven't had controversial issues before the Board, so it doesn't surprise me, but we do have very limited public feedback. The Board does try to address the problem by requesting concerns in writing before the meeting if unable to attend, but so far there haven't been many.

One meeting where we really count on attendance is the HOA Annual Meeting. Since it is being held on January 23, 2021, this article is to explain how residents can easily Zoom to attend. We want to prepare folks ahead of time so they can practice or troubleshoot before the actual meeting.

This is what you need to do:

- 1. You don't actually need to install anything to use Zoom on a desktop or laptop. All you need is a web browser, like Chrome.
- 2. When you get the invitation to join a Zoom meeting, save the invite in your Inbox, because it has the URL you will need to access the meeting.
- 3. When it is time for the meeting, click on the meeting URL (which is blue below)

- 4. A new tab will open in your browser, and if you have the desktop client app installed, the meeting will bounce over to the app.
- 5. However, if you don't have the desktop client software, then the Zoom browser window will ask you to download it. Ignore that suggestion and skip down to the fine print underneath: "If you cannot download or run the application, join from your browser."
- 6. Click the highlighted text in "join from your browser" and you'll be presented with a Zoom meeting page. Sign in with your name and join the meeting.

Also included in the invite is the option to call in to Zoom on your cell phone which requires a meeting ID and a passcode. It will look like this:

Why do Coyotes Howl?
and other factoids about our canine neighbors by Pat Keenan

I don't know about where you live in the Springs, but down here at the end of Calle de la Pelotita, we're seeing and hearing more coyotes than ever. And a lot of people think when the coyotes howl their evening chorus, that they sound a lot closer than in the past - "Just over the wall." In fact, one of my neighbors on Golfista worries that when he is grilling steaks and needs to go back into his house for a beer, he might come back and find the coyotes have taken his steaks. (However, this hasn't stopped him from getting the beer.) I felt the situation called for some coyote research before people start to panic.

General Facts: Coyotes weigh 15 to 40 pounds and stand about 2 feet at the shoulder. They can run 40 mph and can easily jump a 6 ft fence. They mate for life. Life span is about 8-10 years in the wild. Coyotes can truly be called "wiley." With their adaptability and intelligence, they are gradually expanding their range back into suburbs and cities.

Why do coyotes howl? Wildlife experts think they howl for territorial reasons. So if a coyote is out hunting and gets lost, he can howl to locate other members of his pack. Or if the pack sees a strange coyote (or dog), they will howl. People have a tendency to overestimate the number of coyotes in the chorus. The typical pack has 5 or 6 members, even though it probably sounds like 20. Coyotes have several other vocalizations besides howling to communicate with other pack members. For example, they growl to express anger and communicate with their pups by "yips, whining, and huffs." (Sounds like Congress to me.)

Will they eat my little cat or dog? They would love to. Coyotes are omnivorous. They specialize in rodents, but will eat garbage, fruit, compost, insects, chickens or the occasional pet

cat or dog. They prefer smaller breeds of dog. However, any size dog tethered on a rope cannot match a coyote attack.

Here is an example of what NOT to do: A building construction crew in Toronto fed pizza to a pair of coyotes while on their lunch break. The coyotes became "tame". The crew called them mascots. "They were so cute". The crew went on to their next job, and neighborhood pets started to disappear. The coyotes had to be shot.

Will coyotes attack me? Extremely unlikely. In the history of Canada and the USA, coyotes have killed only 2 humans. One victim was an unattended baby in a crib in Southern California. The other died after being bitten by a rabid coyote. Coyotes can transmit rabies to dogs. Coyotes have occasionally bitten humans when cornered or when a dog owner tries to break up a dog/coyote fight. According to the American Humane Society, you are more likely to die from a stray golf ball than from a coyote attack.

What to do if you see a coyote while walking the nature trail?

- 1. If it runs off, no problem.
- 2. If it keeps coming, wave your arms and yell. That should get him running away.
- 3. If it still keeps coming, the behavior is abnormal and is concerning. The coyote may have been fed by humans and has lost its fear of humans. Or worse, it could have rabies. Back off, keep yelling, but don't turn and run.

Conclusion: Don't feed pizza to coyotes and keep your eye out for wild golfers.

Recently, Sally donated her time and materials and sewed many hundreds of face masks, asking for a


donation to the local Food Bank, and raised over \$5,000 for the Food Bank. She also sewed & donated masks for the Food Bank clients & their children.

What Is This Thing Called the Master Association?

Recently, several of you have been asked to sign an absentee ballot for the annual meeting of Santa Rita Springs HOA, aka The Master Association. This is not to be confused with our HOA, The Springs at Santa Rita HOA. Let me provide a bit of history for you.

The Master Association members include The Springs, The Fairways, The Links, The Greens, The Legends, Sunrise Pointe, Sunrise Pointe Vistas and Silver Springs. The association was the brainchild of the developers of these HOA's and the retirement facility. They wanted to make certain that all of the HOA's would maintain their original style and adhere to good architectural rules. Originally the Master Association had the responsibility of approving all of the ARC requests for all eight member HOA's. This became an insurmountable task. So, about 15 years ago all the the CC&Rs were rewritten to give that responsibility back to each individual HOA. So, why does the Master Association still exist?

The developers had a second purpose in establishing the Master Association and that was they wanted all of the homeowners to have access by foot, bike, golf cart from one to the other. A path with a bridge was built between The Springs and The Greens. It is near the Farmer Waters water tank. It exists to this day. The Board of the Master Association consists of three officers – president, secretary and treasurer. Plus, there are representatives from each member HOA. The board has three meetings a year. The main task is to establish a budget to maintain the path, keep the bushes under control and to fix the railings on the bridge which get clipped now and again. It also establishes a reserve for the potential that the bridge might someday need to be replaced. The cost to each homeowner is \$3.25/year and it is included in your annual HOA dues.

Given the need to be safe with Covid amongst us, we need your signatures on the absentee ballot in order to conduct the annual meeting. Thanks for helping us out. The ballot is at the end of this CHAT.


