Board Business

Highlights From Your December 2022 HOA Board Meeting By Cathy Roberts

We continue with the hybrid in-person/Zoom format for our meetings. The November meeting was called to order with better than average homeowners present; 20 on Zoom and 16 in-person. Roll was called and a quorum was established.

Board member reports were presented and can be found in their entirety on the HOA web site, www.thespringshoa.org for your review. A brief synopsis follows.

- President: Has continued work with the ARC and our attorneys to clearly define timelines and requirements as it relates to noncompliance issues with the CC&Rs. Consulted with the VP regarding upcoming board election. Addressed concerns of residents related to standing water, pack rats, etc.
- Vice President: Announced that a full slate of candidates have submitted applications for board positions. Elections will occur at the Annual Meeting in January.
- Treasurer:

- ARC: There have been 45 project requests submitted for approval so far in 2022, 39 of which have been completed. Issues such as bird feeders, non-functioning vehicles parked for an extended period, and pet potty courtesy were addressed.
- Grounds: November posted 148 volunteer hours. That's an impressive number of hours donated by residents. If you are considering joining a volunteer team contact Jim Owen or email Grounds.thespringshoa@gmail.com
- Infrastructure: Mark addressed issues with Republic not emptying the HOA dumpster.

Volunteers are needed to help take down decorations on Monday, January 2 at 1:00 pm. Donations are being accepted through the HOA office for continued improvements and replacement of aging supplies.

Message from the President

I am hearing complaints about issues with mice, packrats, and rattlesnakes in The Springs. One reason they hang around is we feed them. How do we do that? By putting out bird seed which falls on the ground creating a food source for mice and packrats. They become a food source for rattlesnakes, and so on.



Our CC&Rs prohibit any kind of animal feeding except hummingbird liquids. We have brought this up many times in the past but some residents continue to ignore our rules. I don't know why, and it is frustrating and unhealthy/hazardous for us all.

Be a caring team member of our community. If you have bird seed feeders outside please permanently remove them immediately. I have asked the compliance agent to keep a close lookout for such activity. If she sees them we will enforce our CC&Rs. That could include fines and this problem is so easily fixed without resulting to such measures. Thanks for helping take care of our community. It's worth it. Brent Gordy, HOA President

December Potluck



There was a good turnout for the Christmas potluck--64 residents in attendance. As always there was the acknowledgment of birthdays and anniversaries. After consuming the delicious assortment of salads, hot dishes, and desserts, a white elephant gift exchange was orchestrated by host, Kathy Szeto.

The guest speaker was Chris Erickson from Valley Assistance Services which is located here in the Springs (old Dorn building) Chris spoke about services and volunteer opportunities provided by the organization.

Packrats, Birdfeeders, and Compliance

Are packrats a problem? Here's some information you might find helpful.

Where will I find evidence of packrats?

You might see a nest under a low growing prickly pear cactus, in a covered BBQ, or a low growing palm with fronds on the ground. They even like the cute little box built around a sprinkler controller.



How will I know if I have packrats?

Examples of packrat destruction include chewed vehicle wiring, and chewed up outdoor cushions or pillows. Holes in the ground with lots of plant debris piled around the hole are typical evidence of these little critters. They often use the base of prickly pear or cholla cacti as the sites for their homes, using the cactus spines for protection from predators.

Are they multiplying fast?

The breeding cycle is every 8 weeks. They produce 3 to 4 babies at that time.

How can I get rid of them?

When a nest is located, it needs to be removed so that the occupant will move away. If the nest is not removed, another rat will move in. Packrat nests smell bad and can harbor disease.

The desert wildlife food chain goes like this—bird seed, quail blocks, water and pet food attract birds, mice. and packrats. Packrats have poor eyesight and are slow movers, which make them ideal meals for snakes, owls, bobcats and coyotes. All of these predators are capable of entering our walled yards. Just as packrats seek food, predators are seeking their food as well.

What can or should I do?

If you must park your vehicle outdoors, consider investing in a "Rid a Rat." It is a strobe light which runs off a vehicle battery and is mounted with a magnet under the hood. This device is meant to keep packrats from nesting under the hood. They are carried at the local hardware stores.

Prevention and trapping are the best controls because poisons kill the predators who feed on packrats.

Don't put out bird food. The CC&Rs do not allow feeding birds or wild animals other than hummingbirds. Bird feeding can be written up by our compliance agent.

Where Have you Been??

There's a song that goes, "Yesterday when I was young." Yes, it does seem like yesterday when we were young and loved planning trips, exploring new areas, driving distances, etc. We bicycled trails in many states and hiked all over the US, but now that we are in our 80s, our hiking boots only see the nature trail in Madera Canyon, our bicycles go no further than Quail Creek, and our traveling is quite often by bus with a tour group. That being said, we still think "it's the good life."

In October Jim and Eileen Owen booked a five day **Fall Colors** tour with Pleasurebent Tours. We spent two days in Flagstaff and two days in Show Low.

Upon arriving in Flagstaff, we visited the Riordan Mansion which borders the NAU (Northern Arizona University) campus. The Riordan mansion (house) was built in 1904 for two Riordan brothers who brought the lumber business to Flagstaff. We had a docent led tour arranged by the tour company. (Docent led tours are always the best way to learn facts about the site you are visiting.) After the tour we checked into Little America hotel for a two night stay. In my opinion, Little America is one of the best hotels in Flagstaff—spacious rooms, great restaurant, and a 3 mile walking path behind the hotel.

The next day we visited the Museum of Northern Arizona which included their annual "Day of the Dead" Festival. In the afternoon we traveled to Snowbowl, a ski area located in the San Francisco peaks, to see the fall colors and views.



Day 3 we traveled east to Meteor Crater & Barringer Space Center. The mile wide crater is the results of an asteroid traveling 26,000 miles per hour hitting the earth 50,000 years ago. Once again, we had a scheduled tour where we learned many interesting facts about the crater's discovery.

The afternoon was spent visiting La Posada Hotel a restored historic hotel in downtown Winslow, Arizona, designed by Mary Elizabeth Jane Colter, a visionary architect who has designed and furnished some of our Southwest's most fascinating buildings. Lunch was at the Turquoise Room, a southwestern style restaurant inside the Hotel. Then on to Show Low for a two night stay.

The next day we traveled to Eagar, AZ, and spent the afternoon at R Lazy J Wildlife Ranch, a 65 acre wildlife conservation ranch that focuses on breeding and exhibiting wildlife while educating the public about rare and endangered animals from all over the world. The first part of the tour was a walk through area where we saw many penned animals and birds, one animal being a sloth who loves carrots.










Next, on our guided tour open air tour wagon, we got to feed some of the roaming animals like camels and water buffalo.

Our last day and journey home included a stop near Payson for a short hike to see the fall colors on the Mogollon Rim. The Mogollon Rim separates the high desert of northeastern

Arizona from the low desert of southeastern Arizona. The rim is 1000 to 2000 feet high and covered with forest. Colors were beautiful.

Pleasurebent Tours is located in Tucson and most of the participants on this tour had done at least one previous trip with the company (including us). A big plus is they pick you up at your front door and return you there at the end of the tour.

Spotlight on the Rescue Pet

Who is the rescuer? Mary or Noelle?

Those of you who have live in the Springs for any length of time know Mary Yager. Anyone who walks in the Springs has seen Mary and her fur baby, Noelle. Sometimes they are "out and about" two or three times a day, depending on Noelle's mood that day. Most of us with pets know who's in charge! There are many health benefits of owning a pet. They can increase opportunities to exercise as well as get you outside and socialize. Some days Mary's walks take twice as long because of the many neighbors and friends she talks with on her route around the Springs.

Our long time resident, Mary Yager has lived in the Springs since 2000. She retired from teaching in upstate New York at age 55. Mary taught physical education and coached women's softball; a high light was was when her team went to the NY State Women's Softball Championship. After retirement, seeking a new destination, she talked with fellow teacher, Barb Wolf, and both ended up in Green Valley, in the Springs.



Mary is no stranger to rescue pets. She has had two previous rescue dogs, Freckles and Rascal (both cocker spaniels). Her present rescue pet, Noelle, is a mixed breed, and was adopted from the Animal League of Green Valley about a year ago. Noelle was estimated to be around four years old and was found wondering around by herself. She was spayed but not chipped. Her loving nature led the Animal League to believe she was well cared for by a previous owner although she was in need of major grooming. It was love at first sight by both Mary and Noelle--a happy ending for all.

Many residents here in the Springs have rescue pets. It goes without saying that when you adopt a rescue pet, you're saving a life—but you're actually saving more than one. By adopting, you're helping make space for another animal in need and helping to give them the opportunity to become beloved pets.

A requested favorite potluck recipe from the past

Chicken Enchilada Casserole

(Pam Koruga)

- 2 large cans green chili enchilada sauce
- 4 chicken breasts
- 2 (8oz) pkg. shredded Mexican blend cheese
- 8 flour tortillas

Put the two cans of green chili enchilada sauce and chicken breasts in slow cooker. Cook on slow for 8 hours Remove chicken from cooker and shred. Then add 1 cup of enchilada sauce from the cooker and 1 pkg of cheese. Mix together.

Put mixture into each of the 8 tortillas and roll up. Put enchiladas seam side down in 9×13 greased baking pan. Pour rest of green enchilada sauce from cooker over tortillas and the other package of cheese. Bake 350 for 30 minutes.
