




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FROM THE PRESIDENT, REBECCA KEENAN

Editor's Note: Last August the CHAT contained an article about a new program called Heartsafe. Over the summer a core group of individuals studied the possibility of using volunteers to provide first responder services to The Springs for sudden cardiac arrest. Much has happened since then, and the CHAT will be publishing a series of articles to bring all homeowners up to speed about the accomplishments of the Heartsafe committee. The HOA Board has been studying whether to support the program as part of The Springs, or to recommend it be separate from our HOA. The Board wants the entire Springs community to be aware of the possibilities. Please read on, and talk to your neighbors afterward. Springs' HeartSafe Community

The Springs is about to embark on a wonderful program to potentially save a neighbor who has suffered cardiac arrest. Those of us who volunteered to participate in the study last summer can hardly wait to finalize the program and get approval to move forward. Here's the story:

Almost 2 years ago, The Springs HOA was asked if we would participate in a cardiac arrest study sponsored by two eminent cardiologists at the University of Arizona Sarver Heart Center, Dr. Marvin Slepian and Dr. Karl Kern. The study was designed to determine whether informed volunteers trained to be on call first responders could arrive at a home sending out a 911 distress call coded as a cardiac emergency with equal time if not better than professional responders, in our case our local fire department. The HOA Board gave us a "thumbs up" to recruit volunteers and stage mock cardiac emergency events in the community.

In early May of 2018, we began the mock trials. Chief Chuck Wunder of the Green Valley Fire Department supported the study and took the lead on setting up the field trials. When the simulated emergency calls were made, the professionals responded as if it was a real call. Thirteen resident volunteers acted as community responders. We conducted twenty days of mock calls at random times throughout the summer. Each community volunteer received a text message directing them to a certain address for each trial. Some were assigned to pick up an AED at one of the designated spots in The Springs. The others went directly to the home address. During those trials we were told to go about our normal business and not be waiting for the messages otherwise the study would be less realistic. Volunteers arrived by car, golf cart or bicycle. One arrived in pajamas.

The Springs is an ideal community in which to conduct this study because we are the Green Valley neighborhood that is the furthest from our assigned fire station. During the mock emergencies, paramedics arrived very quickly (in just over 7 minutes in each case) but the community volunteers who live nearby arrived in about one and a half minutes. This is an average of 5 minutes 42 seconds (almost 6 minutes!!) before the professional rescuers.

In cases of sudden cardiac arrest, starting CPR and using an AED before the professionals arrive can be the difference between life and death. The results of our mock trial study were presented by Dr. Kern at the most recent American Heart Association Resuscitation Science Symposium in Chicago in November 2018.

Editor's Note: There is more to this story and the Heartsafe committee has been very organized and diligent in their actions to move the program into action. There are some issues for which the Board has requested more information and the Heartsafe committee is now preparing that information. Next in the series is a more detailed description of AEDs, procedures, and options for Springs residents. Stay Tuned, and thank you to the motivated volunteers who have contributed time for this important study.

Heart-healthy Bran muffins Adapted From “ OVER SIXTY”

Heat oven to 400 degrees F. Line 12-cup muffin pan with paper liners or grease VERY well.

1 1/2 cups unprocessed wheat bran (miller's bran)
1/2 cup boiling water
1/4 cup vegetable oil
Mix together in medium bowl and set aside.

1 egg
3/4 cup sugar (can use less)
1 cup buttermilk
Mix together and set aside.

1 1/4 cups white flour
1 1/4 tsp baking soda
1/2 tsp salt
Mix together and add to wet bran mixture. Then add buttermilk mixture and gently stir.

3/4 cup golden raisins
1/2 cup chopped nuts (optional)

Stir in just until mixed and then divide into the 12 cups in muffin tin. Bake for 16-18 minutes. 😊

Words of wisdom from Howard Bryan, a past president,
which were written March 2016.

“As President, I get to hear various concerns from our homeowners. One such concern is about views from homeowner’s properties being impacted by growing vegetation. Since this comes up periodically, I did some research on the topic and would like to share what I have learned.

The HOA Board has previously sought advice from our attorney about views. Here is what was advised...“It is a basic principle of real property law that there is no legal right to view preservation without a specific view easement. There is no such easement in the governing documents for The Springs at Santa Rita.” Therefore, there are no guaranteed views in The Springs.

To my knowledge, the only community near us which indirectly deals with this issue is The Legends because they reportedly have a specific section of their CC&Rs which limits all tree heights to that of the buildings. Our CC&Rs were not written with similar language. To add such a provision would require a 51% vote of ALL homeowners (about 226 owners). Our CC&Rs have only been amended twice. Once was to remove the original developer language and meet our attorney’s recommendations. The other was to change the definition of a quorum at our Annual Meeting. In both cases, after a two year effort, we just barely achieved the needed votes on those relatively noncontroversial changes.

People tend to be passionate about keeping their views and equally passionate about keeping their trees. Also many people have no significant views from their properties, therefore, it is my opinion that it would be very difficult to secure the required 51% majority approval of a tree height restriction in our community.

As a point of history, when the developer originally sold the lots, he was able to charge a higher price for lots which had a view. However, there was no guarantee given that the view would be preserved in the future. Still today, lots with views tend to command a higher selling price but they also do not have any guarantee that the view will be preserved. Some residents have had success in politely discussing the issue of view degradation with their neighbors to see if something could be worked out including helping with periodic trimming.”
