From The President

Late spring is a time of transition for The Springs and, indeed, southern Arizona. Some of our wonderful neighbors return to their homes in more temperate climes. Our outdoor summer activity is somewhat restricted to early mornings, later evenings, higher elevations, pools, and indoor gyms. And, here in The Springs, our Infrastructure team looks to complete roads and buildings projects that will have the least impact on our neighbors because we have a bit smaller population in spring and summer months.

This spring and summer are no different. You have already received a notice from our Infrastructure Chair, Victor Frankfather, regarding the contractor's painting of the entrance to The Springs including the Frontage Rd. walls, gatehouse area, and bell tower. We will also be re-sealing the streets that were not paved last year. The gate area painting will begin on or about April 22. The road re-sealing is scheduled for on or about May 14.

We will also begin an active project to reduce speeding into and out of the front gate and refurbish all the STOP stencils and stop lines at intersections with STOP signs. We'll be using quick drying traffic paint to reduce inconvenience. We'll publish email blasts that will keep everyone informed as these projects are about to begin and how long they will last.

All the road work, except the re-sealing, will be done by volunteers. None of the volunteer work will include heavy lifting or hours in the hot sun. It will consist mostly of painting stencils on the streets, placing small signs on posts, glueing small items on the streets at strategic points, and helping with traffic control. All this work will hopefully reduce speed and the potential for car/pedestrian accidents, particularly at the gatehouse, where paid staff and volunteers work in the gatehouse office fairly regularly. We have had more than a few close calls at the gate area both incoming and exiting. We have also fielded concerns from some residents about drivers ignoring or quick rolling though STOP signs.

One final note: Please contact us at hoa.thespringshoa@gmail.com if you'd like to volunteer for the road projects! We'd love to have a team of ready volunteers so we can complete projects quickly. Many hands make small work. Thank you!

FROM DOG POOP TO SNAKES

Residents don't like dog poop on or near the sidewalk, street, or nature trail, this includes bags of poop thrown into the open area. They don't like to see, smell, or step in it. But there are other reasons for residents to dislike poop being left behind.

First, the dog owner lets the dog off the leash, the dog poops and the dog owner doesn't pick up the poop or picks it up and throws it into an open area. Then the dog poop draws rodents, insects and bugs. Rats, mice, skunks, ticks, mosquitoes, and roaches enjoy dog poop. Mice draw tarantulas.



Then the rodents draw raptors. Rodents are a primary food source for birds, including owls, eagles, and falcons.

Then the raptors draw snakes. The basic snake diet includes birds but the snake can bypass the raptors and go straight for the rodents and most species will eat small mammals such as chipmunks, prairie dogs, gophers, ground squirrels, and rabbits.

Then the snake bites the dog. Approximately 150,000 dogs and cats are bitten by venomous snakes each year in the US and bites from nonvenomous snakes are thought to be even more common. But don't worry... on average, snakes in the wild eat only once every 2 to 3 weeks and often hunt at night.

Put simply, after the dog owner lets the dog run free...the dog takes a poop, the rat eats the poop, the bird eats the rat, the snake eats the bird. Then the snake bites the dog. Snakes never heard the phrase "Don't bite the hand that feeds you."

Residents don't typically like rats, mice, tarantulas, skunks, ticks, mosquitoes, roaches, prairie dogs, gophers, or snakes which are all ultimately drawn because of the dog's poop. The residents often don't like the loss of birds, chipmunks, ground squirrels and rabbits resulting from mother nature's circle of life that originates from the dog's poop.

Pima County Dog Solid Waste Regulations state it is unlawful for the owner or person having custody of any dog that is not physically restrained by a leash or, fails to immediately remove and dispose of any solid waste deposited by the dog in a sanitary manner and is punishable by a fine of not less than one hundred dollars nor more than seven hundred fifty dollars, up to forty days in jail, or up to two years' probation, or any combination thereof. No judge may grant probation in lieu of, or otherwise suspend, the imposition of the minimum fine.

This is the reason why the HOA Board puts up signs requiring dog owners to pick up dog waste and keep the dog on a leash.

Highlights From Your April 9, 2024 HOA Board Meeting By Cathy Roberts

The meeting was held in the Anza Room following the hybrid format. The meeting was called to order with a total of 15 homeowners present. Roll was called and a quorum was established.

- President: Worked with Lee, Mark, and Sharon to resolve issues with Republic for the dumpster near the OK Corral. Responded to concerns by residents. Worked with Dark Skies Southern Arizona and GV News to observe the lighting in The Springs. Biggest offender is the GVR rooftop lights. Worked with Rick and Victor on new signage. Reviewed AZ legislation that may impact our HOA.

- ARC: 45 new maintenance notices mailed out related to painting, etc. needs. One home owner received a final notice. 38 weed violations issued
- Grounds: There were 642 total volunteer hours for 2024. Bruce shared that according
 to a study done by the University of Maryland, the average landscaper receives
 \$31.40/hr. That's roughly \$20K saved just in March by having a volunteer crew. Always
 remember to thank these folks when you see them out working on our behalf. They are
 saving us money while being a good neighbor. The need for workers doesn't stop when
 the snowbirds leave. The Buffle grass is still there and needs pulled. If interested in

- Infrastructure: Monday, April 22 is the target date for the painting of the gatehouse, bell tower, and perimeter fence to commence. A 50% deposit has been paid toward the project. Shooting for sometime in May for Tucson Asphalt to resume their work. They will also assess and repair areas of breakdown on previously competed work.

There was a need to adjust the equipment maintenance budget. All the power equipment and vehicles used by the grounds crew is aging. Most repairs, such as chain sharpening, is done by volunteers like Gary Moe. All the crew uses their skill and knowledge to keep things running with the least expense to homeowners. Occasionally there are things beyond their expertise or an item such as tires that are needed.

Watch for education upcoming related to Dark Skies and Pet leash and waste warning signs.

Expect new guidelines from GVR as it relates to reserving meeting space.

Pima county allows you request a sewer fee vacant rate for the months you are away from Green Valley. There is still a fee but it is lower than regular billing. You will need your account number from your billing record. You will also need the dates for when you are leaving and when you will be returning. http://pima.gov In the search box, key in "suspend sewer" and hit enter. Look for sewer billing suspension, click on that link and complete the form, or call phone # 520-724-6609.

Donate non perishable items left in your fridge or pantry to the Green Valley Food Bank.

Make sure the HOA Office has your summer contact phone number as well as the phone number of your property manager while you are gone. When an emergency occurs these numbers are important.

The Sheriff's Auxialry Volunteers (SAV) will check the outside of your home while you are gone. There is no cost for this service. Phone 520-351-6744.
